Iwi buys prison land

Ngati Tuwharetoa has signed an agreement to buy most of the land occupied by Tongariro-Rangipo Prison.

Some 8500ha of Crown land to the south and east of Turangi is being purchased by the iwi group, comprised of the Tuwharetoa Settlement Trust and six other Tuwharetoa entities, including forestry and farm trusts and a collective hapu entity.

The conditional sale and purchase agreement was announced last week by the Tuwharetoa Settlement Trust chairman Dylan Tahau and Corrections Minister Peseta

Sam-Lotu-liga.

Tongariro-Rangipo Prison is due to be upgraded and its farm and forestry operations downsized later this year with the loss of 67 jobs. After the land sale goes through, the Crown will lease the land for the prison from Tuwharetoa. The iwi group paid about \$20 million for the land and the price paid for the forestry crop on the land is undisclosed.

The Central North Island Forest Collective Settlement deed, which was signed by the Crown and eight central North Island iwi in 2008, granted the iwi collective the right to purchase Crownowned land from Corrections. Negotiations to buy the land have taken a year.

The land is important to Ngati Tuwharetoa as it includes several wahi tapu and two rivers, Tongariro and Waiotaka.

Under the terms of the

sale, Corrections will retain the prison buildings and ancillary buildings and lease the land under them, together with about 700ha for a training farm, from the Tuwharetoa Settlement

Tuwharetoa Settlement
Trust chairman Dylan Tahau
said the deal has significant
strategic and commercial
benefits for the iwi partners,
but most importantly the
purchase sees the return of
Tuwharetoa land.

"This is a great milestone for our iwi and we are really pleased that the partnership has been able to work closely to get to this point. "Purchasing this property and agreeing a lease-back is a major benefit for Tuwharetoa, and will support our economic, social and cultural development."

Tuwharetoa Settlement
Trust through its Tuwharetoa
Property Investment Limited
Partnership has also
purchased the land under
nine schools in Taupo, other
Corrections property, and the
Taupo Courthouse through
the deferred settlement
process. These purchases
make the iwi one of the
largest landowners in the
Taupo township. The deal
will be formalised at a
ceremony on June 30.
